#### Leap Year Fun Fact:

Julius Caesar introduced the first leap year around 46 B.C., but his Julian calendar had only one rule: Any year evenly divisible by four would be a leap year. That created too many leap years, but the math wasn't tweaked until Pope Gregory XIII introduced his Gregorian calendar more than 1,500 years later. Caesar's concept wasn't bad, but his math was a little off; the extra day every four years was too much of a correction. As a result, there's a leap year every year that is divisible by four, but to qualify, century years (those that end in 00) must also be divisible by 400. So, the year 2000 was a leap year, but the years 1700, 1800 and 1900 were not.

#### Jeremiah 17:8

"He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for it's leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit."

Over Christmas break I read a book given to me by my brother Chuck called, *Island of the Lost*, by Joan Druett. It is a true story that is told through the writings of the castaways from two ship wrecks occurring in the Auckland Islands in the mid 1800's. This was a time known as the great age of sail, where sailors and captains set upon the sea in search of their fortunes. It was a time of celestial navigation, and uncharted waters were vessels succumbed to the desires of the wind and waves of vast oceans. The Auckland Islands are actually an archipelago located in the Southern Pacific Ocean some 280 nautical miles south of New Zealand.

The two wrecked ships, the schooner Grafton and the bark Invercauld floundered the same year at different points within the Auckland Islands, a location some 20 mile apart. Each crew was faced with the same hardships, that of seeking shelter and securing an adequate food source until a passing ship could rescue them. Many of their resources were plucked from the wrecks they had sailed upon, but the use of these resources and the success within this trial was very different. The Grafton sailed with five men and all survived, the Invercauld sailed with nineteen men and only 3 survived. The difference of these two crews was that the Grafton's men worked together, embraced each other's strengths while not relying on one's weakness. They worked together to solve problems and treated one another with respect. In the case of the Invercauld, their crew lived lives of personal preservation, hoarding resources and failing to work together.

The Auckland Islands are not a hospitable place, located at 50 degrees south latitude. Today there still are no permanent residents beyond the birds and seals who arrive each year as a nesting and breeding location. So what then became the reason for one crew's success and the others failure? Faith is the answer. The captain of the Grafton was a man of faith and one of the items they retrieved from the Grafton was a Bible. Each night they would read from its pages, they prayed before meals and did their best to live by the truth of scripture. Faith was in God and that God was with them, encouraged them in their survival's success. The captain of the Invercauld was not a man of faith and attempted to maintain the hierarchy of power common among sailing vessels of the time. He felt privileged and due specific provisions before any of his men. He demanded respect but offered little in return. He worked for his personal survival at the expense of his crew. He served only himself.

I enjoyed the book, likely because it revolved around sailing and the life of a sailor, but it also shows how in the most difficult trials of our lives our faith can always be relied upon. That God walks with us, encouraging and giving strength. That the lessons scripture gives us not only form our Christian ethic but draw us to serve one another. As Jeremiah wrote, "In times of drought, let's not be anxious but instead let us bear fruit."

**Bausch + Lomb ONE Contact Lens Recycling:** All brands of contact lenses, plus foil and blister packaging. **GoGo SqueeZ Baby Food Pouches Recycling:** All baby and toddler food plastic pouches and caps (such as Go-Go Squeeze, Ella's, Earth's Best, etc.). **Please - Leave caps on to reduce smell and mold.** 

**Brita® Recycling Program:** Brita pitchers, individual filtration bottles, filters, foil filter packaging, and faucet filtration systems. (Must be this brand only.)

Burt's Bee Recycling: Burt's Bee products packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

Cigarette Waste Recycling Program: NO DROP OFF - PLEASE CONTACT AMIE (<u>joelamiekeeton@gmail.com</u> or 309.242.8871) FOR MORE INSTRUCTIONS. Program accepts cold extinguished cigarettes, cigarette filters, loose tobacco pouches, outer plastic packaging, inner foil packaging, rolling paper and ash.

Colgate/Tom's of Maine Dental and Deodorant Recycling: All brands toothpaste tubes and caps, toothbrushes, floss containers, mouthwash bottles and caps, plastic deodorant containers and caps; also, clear plastic cover from toothbrush/dental floss packaging (remove cardboard backing and put in city recycling first). Please note: no aerosol cans which go into regular city recycling.

**Honest Kids Drink Pouch Recycling Program:** Flat, flexible aluminum/plastic drink pouches and their straws. Any brand accepted. Must be completely empty.

**Entenmann's Little Bites Pouches Recycling Program:** Entenmann's brand Little Bites plastic pouches and clear Entenmann's Minis packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

eos: eos lip, lotion and shave packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

**Febreze®** Air Care Recycling Program: All brands of air freshener plastic cartridges, plugs, packaging and flexible plastic film packaging, trigger heads and Mr. Clean Deep Cleaning Mist bottles and trigger heads. (Aerosol spray cans go into city recycling).

**Garnier** Personal Care & Beauty: Emptied Plastic Garnier personal care or beauty product containers, tubes and lids. (Must be this brand only).

**Gerber®:** Gerber baby food packaging and small and large hook Gerber Baby clothing hangers. (Must be this brand only.)

**Gillette® Razor Recycling Program:** All brands of razor blades; plastic and metal razors; flexible plastic bags and rigid plastic razor packaging. Clean and dry before donating.

GOLDTOE® Socks: All brands of used, clean socks.

Kroger - Our Brands Recycling Program: Kroger flexible plastic packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

<u>Late July® Snacks Recycling Program</u>: Late July® brand plastic snack packaging and chip bags. (Must be this brand.)

**PopSockets® & Cell Phone Cases:** Grips, mounts, wallets, and similar phone accessories, this program is brand-specific, which means you can only collect PopSockets products. However, you can collect **phone cases from ANY brand** for recycling.

**Swiffer® Recycling Program:** Swiffer refills: Sweeper, Duster and WetJet pads. (Must be this brand only). **Takis® Snacks:** Takis Snacks, Takis Rolled Tortilla Chips, Takis STIX, Takis POP!, Takis Waves, Takis Kettlez, and Takis Crisps flexible plastic bags and containers. (Must be this brand only).

**Tide Free Recycling Program:** Fabric care products and packaging from brands Tide, Gain, Downy, NBD & Dreft, including plastic components (dispensing cup, bag, nozzle clip) and plastic packaging wrap, flexible plastic bags, rigid plastic tubs and lids and Tide To GO pen. (Must be these brands only).

Toys & Games: VTech and LeapFrog electronic learning devices and electronic toys program and Hasbro Toys and Games: For the full list of accepted items, <u>view the VTech & LeapFrog FAQ</u> and <u>Hasbro</u> list of accepted items. (Must be these brands only.)
