As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God. Psalm 42:1

Many of you have heard how Psalm 42:1 as put to music, brought me peace and comfort in God's greater plan on the three occasions when my son Seth underwent open heart surgery. Marjorie Thompson, in Soul Feast, explains how we look for Christ to reshape us into the persons we were created to be, growing in gratitude, trust, obedience, humility, compassion, service and joy. She then adds, "The more fully we can entrust ourselves to God, the more freely God's loving purpose can be worked out."

In my approach to pastoral ministry I have served in a two-fold manner. I am comfortable with church administration, including areas of finance, facilities and personnel. Second, I maintain a desire for continued study and discovery of theology. This has brought depth and greater understanding to the triune God. The area I have often neglected or has been pushed aside is in personal and corporate spirituality. This is an area I wish to develop to a level of life practice.

I have served as the pastor of St Luke Union Church for 15 years and believe we continue to be a healthy congregation and remain in-tuned with Jesus' greater mission for his church. I love serving all of you and do not have any intentions of leaving until it is time for retirement. I do hold a strong desire to finish strongly and not acquire a "coast to the finish" attitude. Understanding my strengths and weaknesses. I have begun to look at ways to bring about a spiritual re-awakening, and reclaim my passion for ministry. To do this I have begun looking into the logistics and funding of a planned renewal sabbatical in 2026. I have come to realize that such a need has developed out of my personal and professional practice. I grew up in a home that held an expectation of hard work and success. Upon becoming a pastor I held the same standard for myself. It wasn't until several years into a pastoral life that I was introduced to the concept of sabbatical. I never took the idea seriously and rationalized I would never be able to figure out what to do while away from the life of leading Christ's church. Perhaps my sense of responsibility produced a fear of the congregation faltering. Things began to change in my approach to ministry following several major life events. Those included my sons' departure from home and what that meant for my marriage. Then undergoing open heart surgery and how I achieved my recovery goals. These life events have caused me to reflect on how I balance my personal life and called ministry. During my tenure with St Luke Union I have been awarded a Doctor in Ministry Degree, and oversaw a major building campaign and project. In 2020 we battled the COVID pandemic and how we saw loss of participation and a disruption to worship, programs, and congregational relationships. There has been an emotional toll walking with so many in times of celebration, grief, and conflict. The final realization for the need of a renewal sabbatical was last fall when I was invited to help a local farmer with the harvest. Farming was something I always wanted to do, but couldn't for obvious reasons. In farming I discovered that I needed time to not be in charge. I discovered that to be renewed, I needed some time to not be constrained by the emotional swings of pastoral life and congregational care.

St Augustine said, "Our hearts are restless until it rests in you." He also said, "God is always trying to give good things to us, but our hands are too full to receive them". In my 18 years of ordained ministry, I seldom have found the opportunity to worship in the vulnerability of my heart. In my sabbatical I wish to worship, commune, and participate in spiritual practice, to grow a deeper relationship with God and to reaffirm the covenant I have made with Sandi and my family. The result will be a pastor who will better serve the congregation he has been called to and affirmed. A pastor with a renewed passion and spirit to serve. A time when St Luke Union Church can grow independently of my leadership allowing for new voices of God's inspiration to be heard.

Marjorie Thompson writes, "It's time to more fully entrust my life and pastoral life to God" After the deer finds its cool and running water, it's refreshed-self bounds on.

Canned beans - pinto, pork 'n beans, etc.

Pasta - spaghetti, as well as spaghetti sauce

Bausch + Lomb ONE Contact Lens Recycling: All brands of contact lenses, plus foil and blister packaging. **GoGo SqueeZ Baby Food Pouches Recycling:** All baby and toddler food plastic pouches and caps (such as Go-Go Squeeze, Ella's, Earth's Best, etc.). **Please - Leave caps on to reduce smell and mold.**

Brita® Recycling Program: Brita pitchers, individual filtration bottles, filters, foil filter packaging, and faucet filtration systems. (Must be this brand only.)

Burt's Bee Recycling: Burt's Bee products packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

Cigarette Waste Recycling Program: NO DROP OFF - PLEASE CONTACT AMIE (<u>joelamiekeeton@gmail.com</u> or 309.242.8871) FOR MORE INSTRUCTIONS. Program accepts cold extinguished cigarettes, cigarette filters, loose tobacco pouches, outer plastic packaging, inner foil packaging, rolling paper and ash.

Colgate/Tom's of Maine Dental and Deodorant Recycling: All brands toothpaste tubes and caps, toothbrushes, floss containers, mouthwash bottles and caps, plastic deodorant containers and caps; also, clear plastic cover from toothbrush/dental floss packaging (remove cardboard backing and put in city recycling first). Please note: no aerosol cans which go into regular city recycling.

Honest Kids Drink Pouch Recycling Program: Flat, flexible aluminum/plastic drink pouches and their straws. Any brand accepted. Must be completely empty.

Entenmann's Little Bites Pouches Recycling Program: Entenmann's brand Little Bites plastic pouches and clear Entenmann's Minis packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

eos: eos lip, lotion and shave packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

Febreze® Air Care Recycling Program: All brands of air freshener plastic cartridges, plugs, packaging and flexible plastic film packaging, trigger heads and Mr. Clean Deep Cleaning Mist bottles and trigger heads. (Aerosol spray cans go into city recycling).

Garnier Personal Care & Beauty: Emptied Plastic Garnier personal care or beauty product containers, tubes and lids. (Must be this brand only).

Gerber®: Gerber baby food packaging and small and large hook Gerber Baby clothing hangers. (Must be this brand only.)

Gillette® Razor Recycling Program: All brands of razor blades; plastic and metal razors; flexible plastic bags and rigid plastic razor packaging. Clean and dry before donating.

GOLDTOE® Socks: All brands of used, clean socks.

Kroger - Our Brands Recycling Program: Kroger flexible plastic packaging. (Must be this brand only.)

<u>Late July</u>® <u>Snacks Recycling Program</u>: Late July® brand plastic snack packaging and chip bags. (Must be this brand.)

PopSockets® & Cell Phone Cases: Grips, mounts, wallets, and similar phone accessories, this program is brand-specific, which means you can only collect PopSockets products. However, you can collect **phone cases from ANY brand** for recycling.

Swiffer® Recycling Program: Swiffer refills: Sweeper, Duster and WetJet pads. (Must be this brand only). **Takis® Snacks:** Takis Snacks, Takis Rolled Tortilla Chips, Takis STIX, Takis POP!, Takis Waves, Takis Kettlez, and Takis Crisps flexible plastic bags and containers. (Must be this brand only).

Tide Free Recycling Program: Fabric care products and packaging from brands Tide, Gain, Downy, NBD & Dreft, including plastic components (dispensing cup, bag, nozzle clip) and plastic packaging wrap, flexible plastic bags, rigid plastic tubs and lids and Tide To GO pen. (Must be these brands only).

Toys & Games: VTech and LeapFrog electronic learning devices and electronic toys program and Hasbro Toys and Games: For the full list of accepted items, <u>view the VTech & LeapFrog FAQ</u> and <u>Hasbro</u> list of accepted items. (Must be these brands only.)

Additional Recycling Collections at the St Luke:

Aluminum Can Recycling: Please put cans in the Large labeled wooden box in the front and center of the garage. Please consider recycling your ALUMINUM cans with us instead of just putting them in city recycling. We recycle locally to get money for charity.

Holiday-Type Light Strands & Cords/Wire/Cable Recycling: Twinkle light bulbs ok to leave on; larger light bulbs should be removed and can be recycled at the lighting section of our local Menards, Lowes or Home Depot. Please remove any other plastic or metal decor before donating light strands.
