St. Valentine

As many of you know I am a dietitian at Carle BroMenn Medical Center. I counsel many clients who are food insecure that have heart problems. When I suggest they access food pantries, the typical reply is that food pantries do not offer many low sodium food items. I am reaching out to you in honor of Heart Month with a request to support a cause that can make a lasting difference in the health and wellbeing of our community: the donation of low sodium food.

Many individuals living with chronic conditions like high blood pressure, heart disease and history of a stroke are in need of healthier food options. Low sodium foods are crucial for those who must limit their salt intake to maintain their health.

Your donation of nonperishable, low sodium food items could truly make a difference. By contributing you will be providing nourishing meals that support better health outcomes.

Low sodium food donation ideas: tub oatmeal; bag of dry beans or no salt added canned beans; no salt added canned vegetables; DASH seasonings; low sodium tuna packets; peanut butter; plain brown rice; Hint of Salt Triscuits; Hint of Salt Wheat Thins or Shredded Wheat.

What they need:

High priority: Canned Soup (pop-top preferred) and Macaroni and Cheese

Canned fruit - preferably packed in natural juice Canned meat – chicken, ham, SPAM Canned fish – tuna and salmon Soups, Stews, Chili - either canned or packaged Boxed dinners – Mac & Cheese, Hamburger Helper Boxed cereals – preferably whole grain, low in sugar Canned beans – pinto, pork 'n beans, etc. Applesauce, Peanut Butter, Crackers, Granola Bars Instant mashed potatoes Pasta – spaghetti, as well as spaghetti sauce Rice

Powdered milk

What they don't need: Anything that has to be baked

Junk food Anything that needs a can opener -- (pop-top cans are best) Anything in glass containers or cellophane wrapping

Resource Team Plans for 2025: In an effort to be stewards of energy and earth resources, the Resource Team continually looks for ways make the church plant be more "Green." The subject of solar panels has been discussed on several occasions with one preliminary thought is always asked, "Rather than putting St Luke Union Church in a position to produce more energy, why don't we first look at what we can do to require less energy?" What has been concluded is that the original church building, built in 1966, has windows that function at 15% efficiency. That means we send a large amount of heat out in the winter and a large amount of air conditioning out in the summer. The Resource Team is putting the final touches on a proposal to begin replacing the almost 60-year old windows with new 85% efficient windows. Each window is being priced out individually and we plan to begin in the office complex. "Come away by yourselves to a lonely place, and rest awhile. 'For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat." (Mark 6:31).

Every winter, since my coming to serve as Pastor of St Luke Union Church, I have taken our youth on a winter retreat at Camp Timberlee in East Troy WI. The weekend is affectionately known as, Winter Extreme. Timber-lee was the place I first attended one of these winter retreats and was owned and operated by the Evangelical Free Church. It has since changed hands several times yet remains true to its mission: To create engaging communities where each young person encounters Christ through a dynamic camp experience. With a vision of: Timber-lee exists to be a refuge where all who come find their joy in Jesus through activities, education, reflection, and worship. My first experience at this camp showed me this was a place that filled all expectation of what camp for young people should be. I so much believed this that both my sons spent weeks there in the summer. At Winter Extreme the youth are fed beyond want, can tube, toboggan out onto the camp lake, sing karaoke, ride horses, zip-line, create in the leather shop, play 9-square and ga-ga ball, explore the nature center, struggle with an escape room, compete in a broom ball tournament, make new friends and simply put their phones down. At each retreat there are multiple times of worship, that includes a "rocking" praise band and youth relatable speaker. What more could youth and their leaders hope for in the dark days of winter?

On Winter Extreme I have always enjoyed the speakers, because they remind me of the passion and energy that brought me to become a pastor. They tell funny stories, can relate to the youth, and challenge them in ways they often didn't expect upon leaving Bloomington. The messages they bring are truly evangelical, and hold no political or personal agenda. Their message is Christ centric and typically to the point, exposing them to a style not often heard at home. These messages sometimes hit our youth right where they are and they realize personal change is needed. Other times these messages put a twist in their stomach making them feel uncomfortable. In either case these worship experiences lead to wonderful discussions on faith and its practice. These retreats allow for our youth to be put in a safe fun place, that they can grow in depth and understanding of the God they believe.

My personal mission and desire for any of the church's youth is for them to graduate and head off into life with a depth of faith. I want them to be able to explain their faith, and feel the twist in their gut when Christ calls them to serve. Timber-lee, though not the same approach to evangelism we use at St Luke Union, is one that is true to placing Christ at the center of our youths lives. Thank you all for your continued support of our youth and making it possible for them to go on retreat and grow in faith.

This year's Winter Extreme Retreat will take place February 18 -March 2nd. Please pray for each of our youth and their leaders.
