Medical Student Assists at Accident Scene SIU School of Medicine Published Date: February 14, 2025



On Saturday morning, Feb. 1, Carson Schaefer and his girlfriend, Julia DeMotte, were driving north on I-57 near Whittington in Franklin County when a car ahead of them drifted into the median and flipped several times. The couple and a semi pulled off the road. Schaefer and the truck driver rushed to the wreckage, and together removed the driver from the car.

Schaefer then used the physical exam skills he'd learned as a first-year medical student at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine to check the driver's heart rate and conduct a brief neurological assessment.

When the EMTs arrived, he shared the information he'd gathered. The accident victim was transported to an area hospital and is recovering from her injuries. In retrospect, the experience left Schaefer shaken but bolstered. "I'm especially grateful that halfway through the first year of training, I felt confident and calm enough to apply what I've learned in the real world," he said. "I'd definitely attribute that to the patient exposure and opportunities we've had to practice techniques with standardized patients. "Schaefer, a native of Downs, III., also credits the collective response from the others on the scene. In addition to the trucker who helped extricate the driver, a second truck driver called 911. A teenager turned off the wrecked car's engine, and another man brought a fire extinguisher. DeMotte brought a blanket from her car's survival kit and gathered the driver's scattered belongings.

"It was pretty special to be able to be part of a team coming together without hesitation to help someone in immediate need," Schaefer said. "I didn't get anyone's names in the moment, but I'll never forget their faces and selfless acts." The spontaneous heroism likely helped ease the trauma for everyone involved. And for Schaefer, the accident reinforced that he has chosen a valuable career path.

STAND DOWN FOR VETERANS WISH LIST

Hand and Foot warmers- Goodwill tries to put at least one of each with the socks so they would like to get at least 250 of each.

Diabetic Socks- black or white; Goodwill would like to provide three pairs per veteran, so the target is **300** pair.

Pillows- Standard-size; Goodwill has a target of **250**.

CHURCH BULLETIN BLOOPERS



- Don't let worry kill you let the church help.
- Thursday night potluck supper. Prayer and medication to follow.

And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. Ephesians 6:18

The church council or VMC has been reading through a book over the last 9 months titled, The Sailboat Church, by Joan Gray. You can guess that the title caught my eye, but I also had the opportunity to hear her speak about her writing. It has been a good exercise for the VMC to discuss some of the suggestions in each chapter, and I'm only a little bothered that she demonstrates her real lack of understanding for sailing. This past month the chapter focused on church conflict and praying. It was quickly discerned that St Luke Union really only has minor conflicts and for the most part we are all on the same boat headed in the direction God wishes to lead. That there is great love for fellow church members and for Jesus our Savior. The prayer subject went a bit deeper with the admission that few of us enjoy praying out loud, while others weren't good at organizing their personal prayers and often became frustrated. I first wish to say that prayer is our primary method for building a positive relationship with God. Prayer when approached as a conversation allows us to speak to God and then take time to listen for a response. This is a good way to understand prayer but the question then came to how best to pray? The simple answer to that question is that the best way to pray is the best way for you to talk to God. No two ways are right or wrong. Personally I pray best when in the woods or on a sailboat, but since I don't spend as much time as id like doing either, I've also developed other options. They include setting aside a specific time each day to pray. This can be when you wake up but haven't gotten out of bed yet, in the shower, before a meal, after a meal, on your drive to or from work, during exercise, while cooking or cleaning, mowing the lawn, working in the garden, or even shoveling snow. The point is that we need to set time aside and that time can be while we are in the middle of something else. The second part of our discussion then turned to what shall we pray?

The ACTS acronym for prayer is commonly attributed to theologian J. I. Packer, and it is a helpful guide for structuring prayer. The ACTS acronym stands for:

- · Adoration: Praising God for who He is.
- Confession: Acknowledging and repenting for one's sins.
- Thanksgiving: Expressing gratitude for God's blessings.
- Supplication: Asking God for help, guidance, or intercession on behalf of others.

I invite you to find a place and a time to pray and have conversation with God, use the acronym if you like, but know that when we pray we always grow closer to God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
